Chair Report 2022

2022 has been an unsettled year for both governance and operational. Without volunteers and staff, DAI has struggled to get members to assist with performing some of the operational tasks, which previously had been undertaken by Kate Swaffer. We were fortunate and grateful to Cheryl Day who helped perform many of these tasks.

Members of the Board were also involved in assisting with some of the operational tasks in addition to their role of governance. I was provided with absence of leave from the Board and Chair following the passing of my wife early in the year. Cheryl Day, having just been appointed to the Board and Emily Ong took on the Chair role as acting co-Chairs.

In January, DAI celebrated its 8th birthday and introduced the Board, which had a few newly appointed members. The full Board comprised Cheryl Day, Emily Ong, Diana Blackwelder, Julie Hayden, Debbie Keay, Terry Montgomery, David Paulson and Bill Yeates.

Kate Swaffer's term on the Board of Alzheimer's Disease International (ADI) came to an end in June. Both Bill Yeates and Emily Ong put forward their nominations to replace Kate and Emily was the successful applicant. Kate has subsequently been appointed to ADI's Nominations Committee. Our congratulations to both Emily and Kate on their nominations.

The Annual General Meeting (AGM) of DAI was moved from June to July to avoid the clash of dates with ADI's Conference held in London. Members were advised that the Board were faced with some difficult decisions regarding the future direction of DAI. The main issue being around finding volunteer members to help perform operational tasks of DAI.

The Board had identified three options for its future direction:

- 1. Wind up DAI
- 2. Merge/amalgamate with another similar type organisation which would still enable our peer-to-peer support groups to operate
- 3. Bring onto the Board non-DAI members (people who do not have dementia) who have governance experience. The Board make-up would comprise a majority of DAI members to non-DAI members and the Chair being a DAI member.
 DAI to employ staff to assist with the day-to day operational tasks. For this to be sustainable additional funding will be required to meet staff costs.

Feedback from members attending the AGM was for DAI to continue and to enable this option 3 was the preferred choice.

There were no nominations for the Board. Alister Robertson was appointed Chair and Bill Yeates as Vice Chair. Terry Montgomery resigned from the Board early in the year and Diana Blackwelder (Treasurer) resigned as at the end of June. The remaining Board members agreed to remain on the Board until a new Board was appointed including non-DAI members.

Two new DAI members Janine Whited and Linda Brewster were appointed to the Board. Kate Swaffer and Bill Yeates put forward their nomination to be appointed to the new Board.

We had good interest from non-DAI members for the Board and Patricia (Trish) Bowen, (Treasurer), Gary Johnson and Jacqueline Wong were appointed.



DAI has been very fortunate with work that Kate Swaffer did in conjunction with others and Flinders University in Australia developing a marketable Licenced program for the health sector. As a result, DAI is a benefactor of any Licences sold receiving a small percentage of the net proceeds.

Jennifer joined DAI during 2014 and was an active member of peer to peer support groups, café's, writer of blogs and general supporter of DAI. Jennifer has written books, provided video's on many topics about dementia and raising awareness of the lived experience of dementia and membership of DAI. Congratulations Jennifer on your passion to improve the lives of all people with dementia, their families and care partners.

The website underwent an upgrade during the year and enhancements are still being made.

I would like to thank all members who have been on the Board during 2022 and special thanks to Cheryl Day who undertook a large portion of the day to day operational tasks as well as taking on the acting Chair role, along with Emily Ong during my absence.
